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ATTENTION EXHIBITORS

PLEASE NOTE: Many changes have been made this year. Please read your Premium Book very carefully. Note changes in the following sections, general rules, and most departments.

TO: All Exhibitors

RE: 2015 Clarion County Fair

July 26-August 1

NOTICE: During the Fair Week, 2015, we will be revising the gate policy and camper locations. To improve the flow of traffic and control the number of vehicles on the grounds, we have established the following:

1. All traffic will enter through the parking field road. The traffic will proceed through the field road leading to the farm gate.

2. Only cars with passes will be allowed in this area, and you must affix the pass to your mirror. This will allow the parking attendant to direct you to the farm gate.
3. Wrist bands must be shown to the gate personnel for all people in the vehicle. The car pass allows the vehicle only.
4. Absolutely no vehicles will be permitted on the grounds from 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. This will be strictly enforced.
5. Vehicle parking area will be established. Please note the area around the barns and the blue building, and the center area around the grandstand and the old merry-go-round building, have been declared fire zones.
6. All persons staying on the Fairgrounds must stay at a campsite. No sleeping in the barns. All youth under age 20 staying all night, must furnish one chaperone who will also spend the night. Chaperone must be at least 21 years old. Chaperone must be registered with the Fair office and provide a roster of those they are responsible for.
7. Fairgrounds close at 12:00 midnight. Barns close at 11:00 p.m.
8. Youth violators of above Fair rules will be released to parents on the first violation. Second violation, youth will be barred from Fair competition. Adult violators will be escorted to the gate.
9. Livestock chairman may designate an adult supervisor to maintain security in the barn areas.

GENERAL RULES

1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Clarion County Fair.
2. The Fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the Fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss, or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
4. Entries will be made according to classification. Entries may be changes to proper categories at the superintendent's discretion. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.
5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette.
6. The Fair reserves the right to determine how many entries it will accept from an exhibitor in the same class or, in the case of livestock, the same breed.
7. THE DECISION of THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL IN ALL CASES except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proved. In such cases, the superintendent, manager, or secretary of the Fair or show, or such referee as he may appoint, may

make the decision. The case may be appealed to the Fair management from whose decision there can be no appeal.

8. All entries must be grown, produced, or made in the area since the last Fair.

9. Superintendents of departments reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, the superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognitions.

10. The fair management may, at any time order the removal of any exhibit or part of the exhibit in bad condition and any article unfit to show may be excluded. Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food.

11. No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the Fair except by consent of the management.

12. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the Fair or show which shall be supplied by the Fair free of charge.

13. During the judging, buildings, except livestock arenas, are to be closed to everyone except Fair officials, judges, PA Fair Fund officials, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor nor his agent shall communicate with the judges during time of determining the awards except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premiums to which he would otherwise be entitled.

14. No exhibitor may enter more than one article in each subdivision of each class in the Home Economics Divisions (Depts. 13, 15, 17, and 18) as well as in the Youth Under 19 Division (Dept. 11). Any article exhibited in 4-H, FFA, or FHA divisions is NOT eligible for competition also in Dept. 11, and therefore may only be registered in one or the other department—not both—regardless of the dates of judging for either. This is in agreement with the purpose of Dept. 11, according to state rules.

15. Entries in Dept. 9, 10, 11, 13, 15, 17, 18, 19, and 20 will be accepted from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Sunday only. No Monday entries will be accepted. Judging in these departments will be Monday. Building will be closed until judging is finished and displays are completed.

16. A Baked Goods Auction will be held with items from Depts. 10, 11, and 15 on Monday at approximately 6:00 p.m.

17. All Home and Garden entries must stay until 8:00 p.m., Saturday evening or premiums will be forfeited. Entries may be picked up Saturday evening from 8:00 to 10:00 p.m. Exhibitors must be able to prove ownership of exhibits before claiming articles.

18. All Livestock entries must stay until 9:00 p.m. on Saturday.

19. While it is the full intention and desire to pay all premiums in full, as advertised in this premium catalog, yet should any contingency arise by reason of unfavorable weather, etc., whereby the receipts of the Association are short and/or the state reimbursement has been reduced or withdrawn, then in that event the Board reserves the right to pay pro-rata upon the gross receipts after deducting the expenses, and the amounts so paid shall discharge the obligations of the Association of the current year.

20. PASSES (Wristbands)—Open Exhibitors \$10.00 with animal entry fee of \$4.00 or more, limited to maximum of two, immediate family only. Exhibitor and camper passes do not permit admission to stage, field shows or rides. **Wristbands must be worn at all times.**

21. Premiums will be paid when State Fair reimbursement funds are received.

22. Entries accepted in the following order—4-H and Clarion County first, previous exhibitors second, others by date of entry, if space available.

23. No pets permitted on fairgrounds—service animals only.

24. Thursday night prior to Fair Week is work night on the grounds.

25. General admission, \$8.00 per person, includes parking, rides, and grandstand seating on a first-come, first-serve basis. Children 2 & under admitted free, unless child will be riding rides. No refunds. Sunday only--\$3.00 per vehicle.

26. Failure to follow any rules as stated will follow the following protocol:

1. Warning exhibitor and/or parent
2. Loss of premiums
3. Remove from fair

NOTICE

All persons who enter the grounds and use the facilities on said grounds for the purpose of exhibiting, displaying, competing, seeing the exhibits, being entertained by the attractions at the fair, or in any other manner participating in the Fair, do so at their own risk.

The Clarion County Fair Association will not intentionally show or permit to be shown any dangerous attractions on the grounds. However, the showing of certain attractions required that spectators be reasonably watchful of conduct of their children, and although the Fair Association will take very precaution, it will not be responsible for any personal injury or property damage suffered by reason of any attraction shown or exhibited during the Fair.

Any person entering the grounds in a state of intoxication or with intoxicating liquor, drugs, or illegal substances in his/her possession, or with concealed weapons on his/her person, forfeits all rights to the Fairgrounds. Pool selling, betting, or immoral conduct of any kind will positively not be permitted on the grounds.

RULES FOR LIVESTOCK

Laura Heasley, Chair; Bill Hepler, Co-Chair

1. Clarion County Fair discourages the use of drugs, biologics, or any chemical from fitting products in the raising of all Junior Livestock Animals being shown at our fair. If it is found upon slaughter, that the meat was in violation of the “Federal Meat Inspection Act”, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.

2. Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed by the chairman; to accept the stall assigned without controversy; to keep their animals in an attractive appearance, and to

cooperate with the fair association in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.

3. Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at shows will be prohibited until after awards have been made in their respective classes by the judge

4. All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owners 30 days or longer. (Livestock entered under a name other than the owner's shall be disqualified for premiums.)

5. The market animal should be weighed on the same set of scales, under a qualified weigh master at the discretion of the Fair.

6. Should any animals awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining lower prizes shall move into the next higher position. If, in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.

7. Over fitting of all livestock will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.

8. When accepted for exhibition, each animal must be shown in a halter and controlled by the owner or employee. The Fair will have standby attendants available during the youth judging or showing, persons designated if there is trouble with the animals. No relatives of an exhibitor should be in the ring at the same time as the exhibitor.

9. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.

10. The IAFE (International Associations of Fairs and Exposition) National Code of Show Ring Ethics shall govern care, showmanship, and conduct for all livestock shows during the Clarion County Fair. These are available for review on their website under the About Us tab.

11. All livestock will be released at 9:00 p.m., Saturday night. No loading prior to that time and it must be done in an orderly manner. All livestock must exit using the top road around the back side of the skating rink.

12. Limited sawdust will be supplied by the Fair Association. Each exhibitor will supply his own grain, hay, and bedding.

13. Any animal which cannot be satisfactorily handled under show conditions will be removed from Fairgrounds in accordance with livestock committee decisions.

14. ALL ANIMALS entered in the breeding classes must be recorded or accepted for registry in the recognized books for their respective breeds. Exhibitors must have registration and transfer certificates available for inspection by management at any time until the judging of the breed is completed. Only original breed registration papers will be accepted when checking entries. No photostats or other copies will be accepted.

15. No animals permitted on grounds before 8:00 p.m., Saturday prior to fair. No security until Sunday. All animal entries must use the farm gate and must be inspected by the barn superintendent before unloading. Check-in times will be from 8:00-10:00 p.m. Saturday and from 9:00 a.m. -- 1:00 p.m. Sunday. The only exception to this rule is if prior arrangements have been made with the livestock superintendent. Health papers must be presented to the barn superintendent before unloading.

16. Exhibitors are responsible for informing themselves as to when their stock will be shown. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call and failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competition.

17. Each exhibitor must submit a \$30 check, separate from entry fee per exhibitor, per species. No animal will be accepted without prepayment.

18. All livestock owners MUST clean stalls and outside the barns by the posted time and must check out with barn supervisor before leaving or the \$30 fee will not be returned. Voided checks will be returned with premium checks.

19. A Building & Grounds Fee of \$3.00 per head and \$.50 per rabbit has been added to entry fees.

20. Concerns should follow this chain of command:

1. Livestock Chair or Co-chair

2. Livestock Committee

3. Executive Board of Fair Assoc. Decisions by the body are considered final.

*If this concern involves youth, an appointed representative from 4-H or FFA will be involved in the decision.

18. Entries close June 27.

19. If an animal bites a person and draws blood, the animal must be removed from the fair and quarantined for 10 days.

HEALTH RULES FOR ALL LIVESTOCK

1. Grooming products and their use—Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are uncertain that a product is residue-safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, do not use it.

2. The base date for computing health rules will be the opening day of the show.

3. Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease, and animals restricted by quarantine may not be assembled for show purposes.

4. All animals admitted to the Clarion County Fair must be accompanied by an official BAHDS indicating compliance with applicable state and federal regulations. A statement by an accredited veterinarian that these animals were **examined after May 1, 2015**, and found to be free of clinical signs of contagious disease shall also accompany these animals.

5. All show animals should be held in isolation for at least 30 days after returning to the herd of origin.

6. CVI's (AAI-13) may be obtained from the Regional Office of the PA Dept. of Agriculture, 13410 Dunham Rd., Meadville, PA 16335, 814-332-6890.

7. CVI's must be presented before animals are unloaded at the fair.

8. Veterinarian should be consulted if the health of an animal is in question.

9. All animals will be housed according to chairman.

10. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement must be signed on the entry form.

11. All animals must have an official ear tag, official legible breed registration tattoo, RFID, and/or scrapies tag.

12. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for **dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, and horses** 3 month of age and older. All vaccine label directions must be followed,

and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable. Market animals are exempt from this vaccination requirement.

HORSE

13. Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA)— All horses must be official ELISA or AGID (coggins) test negative within one year of admission to the show. The negative test report must accompany the horse. The negative test must have been conducted within 12 months of the opening date of the show. Foals less than 6 months of age accompanied by a dam which meets the regulation are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.

14. Horses and other equidae assembled for exhibition, competition, or sale should be immunized to prevent contagious respiratory disease not less than 15 days before the show. Exhibitors are advised to consult their veterinarian regarding proper conditioning and vaccination of their animals at least 30 days prior to the event.

15. Solid color animals must be identified by some method of unique identification such as lip tattoo, brand, or at least 2 distinct markings.

16. PA 4-H Horse and Pony rules require that all horses and ponies entered in 4-H horse shows must be vaccinated against rabies at least one month, but not more than 12 months, before the opening date of the show (revaccination is required each year). Exhibitors can present a statement signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animal was vaccinated. Proof may also appear on the CVI.

BEEF & DAIRY

17. Interstate animals exhibited at PA shows or fairs must meet the PA requirements and must be accompanied by an interstate health certificate to be eligible for entry. A Tuberculosis test is required. Animals originating from Class A, B, or C states must call 717-783-9550 for current requirements for Brucellosis test requirements.

18. During shows, only 1 class of animals permitted in the ring at a time.

19. All dairy animals must be properly registered by their respective dairy breed associations. Registration papers must accompany all animals to the show. All dairy animals shown in group classes must have been shown in their respective individual classes.

SHEEP & GOAT

20. The flock of origin, including sheep consigned to a show, shall be examined by an accredited veterinarian. The bet must prepare the CVI and must state on the CVI that he examined the entire flock and found no evidence of contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease. The date of exam

must also appear on the CVI. All sheep from other states must be accompanied by an interstate CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian indicating examination for health within 60 days.

21. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Official scrapie ID includes:

- A scrapie eartag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie eartags at 1-866-873-2824, weekdays from 9 to 5. Your order may take several weeks for processing so order tags early; or
- A scrapie tattoo with individual animal ID (tattoo); or
- An ISO-compliant RFID tag.

22. Dipping not required of sheep entries from officially recognized scabies free areas; all other sheep must be dipped in an officially permitted solution within 10 days of the opening date of the show.

Swine

23. Brucellosis and Pseudorabies are not required at this point, but the fair board reserves the right to require a brucellosis test and pseudorabies test if it appears in PA prior to the fair. All breeding swine over 6 months of age, must be negative to a brucellosis test after April 1, to be eligible for the entire show season unless they originate from a brucellosis validated swine herd. All breeding swine over 6 months of age for sale following exhibition must be negative to a brucellosis test and pseudorabies test conducted within 30 days of sale date unless they originate from a brucellosis validated and pseudorabies validated herd. Validated certificate number and date of this must be shown on the CVI (AAI-13) prepared by the veterinarian.

24. An animal ID is required. ID options include the following:

- A plastic stamped ear tag
- 4-H/FFA projects must have an official county RFID tag

Show Rules

1. No open horse entry shall show or be entitled to a premium unless stabled at the fair.
2. Horses entered as matched pairs must be owned by one person or firm.
3. Animals or combinations of animals owned by one exhibitor may be entered in the classes noted in premium book.
4. All animals stalled at the fair MUST compete or be shown.
5. In no case is it permissible to show mixed breeds in the same class or division to be judged against each other for premiums.
6. Rules apply to all horses and ponies.
7. Animals must have been entered in individual classes to be eligible to show in group classes.
8. Horses within the grounds will not be removed from the barns after 9:00 p.m. each night of the fair and will not be ridden except in designated areas. Horses must be led to/from the barns to the area of the riding arena. At NO time are horses permitted to be ridden through park or in the camping area.
9. No stallion will be accepted for entry.
10. All riders in classes, except pee-wee, must be able to control their horse, independently, while inside the ring. Assistance entering and exiting the ring is permitted. Any pony or horse which cannot be handled satisfactorily under show conditions and is presenting a danger to its rider, ring crew, and/or spectators will be dismissed from the show. This will be at the discretion of the horse show judge and/or fair officials. In addition, exhibitors and owners are advised that any improper treatment of their animals (as specified in the 4-H rule book and in the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics) will result in disqualification from the show and a forfeiture of entry fees paid.
11. For all classes: Ponies are 14.2 hands or below; horses are over 14.2 hands.
12. Exhibitors must pre-register for all classes that they desire to enter. (Classes may be deleted the morning of the show.) All preregistrations must be made with the fair office by June 27. Do not pay entry fees at the time of pre-registration. Payment of entry fee (\$3 per horse/pony per class) will be accepted the morning of the show at the announcer's booth. At that time, entrants may delete classes from their pre-registered list. All entry fees must be paid and class deletions made before the 9:00 a.m. start of the show. The announcer's booth will open at 8:00 a.m. to accept payment. There will be no reimbursement of entry fees for deletions made after the start of the show. There is no limit on the number of classes an exhibitor may enter.
13. Pee Wee riders are age 10 & under and limited to Pee Wee classes only. Junior riders are ages 14 & under. Senior riders are age 15 & older. Riders under 10 must designate Pee Wee or Junior class and may not compete in both. Pee Wee classes will be Walk/Trot for **pleasure only**.
14. No horse shall be permitted to compete against itself. Therefore each class shall be 1 horse/1 rider. Horses may be shared as long as they are not competing in the same age division or class. Riders may ride more than 1 horse in each class.
15. Show committee at their discretion, can change the order of the classes.

16. The show will be under the guidance of the show judge and their decision will be final.
17. The lunch break time and length will be set by the judge and will be announced.
18. Protective helmets must be worn by all riders in all games.

1. After an animal passes its health examination, then the management will temporarily tag the animal's ear and assign the animal to a cage.
2. Animals will need permanent tattoos. If they do not have a tattoo when they are brought to the fair, one will be given to them during health checks.
3. Cages could be reassigned, if space restrictions require them to be, on the day of arrival—all owners/showers will be notified if this occurs to their animal.
4. All rabbits must be at least 8 weeks old at time of show to be entered for competition.
5. Owners should anticipate having to provide feed for their own animals, but some will be provided by management at the fair if feed is not available.
6. For every rabbit or cavy that an owner sells during the fair week, the management will collect a \$1 fee to go towards the further care and upkeep of our department.
7. Only one pet entry per exhibitor will be accepted.
8. An animal may only be shown in the pet class if not being shown in any other category.
9. A pet rabbit is a small mixed breed rabbit, the characteristics of which the exhibitor finds appealing.

MEAT PEN RULES

1. A meat pen consists of 3 rabbits of the same breed and variety (color).
2. All animals in a meat pen must be under 10 weeks old at the time of the show.
3. Each animal in the meat pen must weigh a minimum of 3 lbs., not over 5 lbs.
4. If one animal in the meat pen is disqualified or eliminated for being overweight or for any other reason, the whole pen will be eliminated.
5. 4-H meat pens must be the 4-Her's rabbit project for the current year.
6. Top placing meat pens may be sold at auction on the Friday of fair week.

ALL JUNIOR EXHIBITORS MUST SIGN & AGREE TO ABIDE BY THE CLARION COUNTY JUNIOR CODE OF PRACTICE AND PA YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM BEHAVIORAL EXPECTATIONS FOR YOUTH.

GENERAL RULES

1. Each item must have been made by a 4-H member who is enrolled in a 4-H project within the current year.

2. Exhibits should portray base requirements as outlined in specific 4-H projects.
3. Pre-registration & additional entries accepted Sunday only, 11:00-5:00 p.m.
4. All animals must follow previously stated animal rules and health regulations.
5. Wristbands—4-H exhibitors \$5.00 with project entry, limit to a maximum of eight per family, immediate family only. 4-H wristbands do not permit admission to stage, field events, or rides.
Wristband must be worn at all times. Car passes--\$5.00.

**GOOD HOUSEKEEPING
PREMIUMS (PER DAY/PER SPECIES)**

1ST--\$20, 2ND--\$10, 3RD--\$5

Good housekeeping will be paid for horses, beef, sheep, swine, goat, and dairy. Daily winners will be posted in the barn areas and premiums included in checks when issued. All species will be judged on the following guidelines MONDAY through FRIDAY only:

- Cleanliness of animal
- Cleanliness of bedding
- Entry card and ribbons won properly displayed with animals
- Keeping grain and hay feed presentable
- Keeping all equipment neat and sanitary
- Keeping aisles clean
- Courtesy to people

**RULES AND REGULATIONS
JUNIOR LIVESTOCK MARKET PROJECT & SALE**

1. Judge's decision final and not subject to question.
2. Members must attend 50% of their club meetings. Each member is allowed to sell in one county only.
3. Animals must be started on feed, identified, and weighed or taped no later than: Steers—November 30 of the previous year, Swine, goats, and lambs—April 15 of current year.
4. A member may show 2 animals. Only one animal may be sold through the sale. A second animal may be put through the Junior Carcass show.
5. The exception to rule 4 is when the exhibitor's carcass animal is champion or reserve champion of a species.
6. Champion and Reserve Champions in the Junior Livestock Show must sell at the sale.
7. Carcass champions will be decided with an ultrasound show.
8. Animals will be weighed as follows: Pigs—Saturday before opening day; Beef, Goats, and Lambs on Sunday, opening day.
9. All animals must be on fairgrounds and penned no later than 1:00 PM.
10. Each exhibitor MUST designate which animal will be in the carcass show at weigh-ins.

11. Members are responsible for the care and feeding of their animals up until the time they are removed from the grounds by the buyer and/or trucker. Each member will be required to assist with promotional and sale related activities as designated by the committee.

12. 4-H or FFA members may show an animal in the fitting and showmanship contest provided it has been carried as a project and is owned by the exhibitor. The exhibitor must show the same animal in both classes.

13. Rules and regulations may be added or amended as the need arises by the Clarion Co. Sale Committee consisting of 4-H leaders, Vo-Ag teachers, and extension representatives.

14. 4-H & FFA members must be present and have charge of their animals at the time of judging.

15. In case of Junior Livestock member cannot be present at time of judging, their animal may be shown by another designated county 4-H or FFA member. The extension and FFA representative must be notified prior to the show or sale. They will not be eligible for grooming and showmanship classes.

16. All market animals must be castrated at the time of tagging.

17. Junior members must wear clean long pants or dress/skirt below the knee. Collared shirt with sleeves, buttoned appropriately, or 4-H T-shirt. No commercial logos other than 4-H or FFA. No bare midriffs. No hats. Appropriate shoes for showing, which should be hard soled shoes, especially for steers and hogs. No sandals.

18. All paperwork must be presented at check in.

1. No consumption of alcoholic beverages or narcotics in track or pit area. Failure to observe rules will result in removal from track or pit area with no refund of entry fee; also will be barred from pulling with this organization for one full year.
2. All contestants must be 12 years of age with written parental consent through age 18. All drivers must wear shoes that completely cover the foot (no sandals), shirt, and long pants before they are permitted to compete. Judges have the right to re-weigh or re-tech any tractor anytime during or after the pull.

3. All engine fans must be shrouded with factory shroud or min. of 1/16" thick steel.
4. No weight may extend more than 24" beyond the most forward point of the tractor.
5. The tractor tires must remain in the boundaries of the contest course.
6. Min. draw bar length of 18" from the center of the rear axle to the point of hook. Draw bar must be stationary in all directions. Max. height of 20" from top of hitching device parallel to the ground. Clevis to be measured to the center.
7. Draw bar to be equipped with steel hitching device not more than 1.5" thick & a 3 1/2" diameter opening. Cross sectional thickness must be measured 7/8" min. to 1.5" max. Pulling point must not be more than 1.5" from back edge of the pulling device.
8. No pressurized tanks unless UL approved. No nitrous oxide, oxygen, or propane.
9. No water injection.
10. All tractors must compete using the fuel that was intended by the factory.
11. All tractors competing must run under a working governor.
12. No portion of the tractor may interfere with any portion of the sled or the sled hitching device during the pull. This includes weights.
13. All weights must be secured to the tractor (no tarp straps). No weights permitted on the seat or deck, inc. cab tractors. Any ballast or external parts lost while hooked to the sled will be cause for disqualification of that class, excluding internal parts.
14. All tractors must be equipped with workable rear brakes. Use of torque converters, power shifts, etc. is permitted.
15. Contestant has 100' to the front of the tractor to decide on change of gear, one restart per class. No restart permitted in a pull off.
16. Driver must be in total control of the tractor at all times while pulling and operate in a safe manner or be disqualified at the discretion of the flag person.
17. Tractor must be stopped upon signal from either track official. Pull is considered over when forward motion of the sled stops, no hole digging allowed.
18. All tractors must be in neutral or park transmission selector while being hooked and unhooked.
19. The number one puller will be the test puller, and may take the pull if the working condition of the weight machine is satisfactory. Driver will have the option to take the pull or drop to the sixth pulling position. All decisions on re-pulls must be made before the tractor leaves the track. In the event the weight transfer is changed, there is no option to drop.
20. Each contestant may spot the sled for their pull. Contestant must notify track official or sled operator before the sled is backed into start position.
21. All contestants must pull in position drawn within 3 minutes of sled spotting or will be disqualified. Track officials must be notified of any delays, and then the contestant may become last puller.
22. All pulls must start with a tight hitch, no jerking.
23. Disqualification for any reason will result in no prize monies for that class.
24. Registration closes at the start of the first class, unless due to traffic conditions. Judges' decision to be final.

25. No bracing above center of rear axle unless cradled, except complete factory setup.
26. Farm stock classes are, but not limited to: 7,500#, 9,500#, 10,500#, 11,500#, and 13,500#.
27. All classes must have hood grill and fenders.
28. There will be a 3000-rpm limit on all classes. Flagman has authority to stop & check.
29. Tire size limited to 20.8" wide and 42" high max.
30. Contest open to two-wheel-drive farm stock tractors with rubber tires. No sharp-ended tires, no dual tires, not studs or chains permitted. Four-wheel-drive tractors are permitted if front wheels are disengaged.
31. Tractor motor and chassis must conform with one another, including carburetor and injection system.

7. Tractors must hitch to a stationary draw bar with a max. 20" height and a minimum of 18" from the center of the rear axle to the hitch point, a clevis is not permitted.

8. Any loss of weights or excess fluids or any part of the tractor during the pull will result in a disqualification. Tarp straps are not allowed anywhere on the tractor.
9. OEM stock intake and exhaust manifolds must be used for that series engine (alterations for turbo mounting ONLY are allowed).
10. Maximum Pump Size—P Pump
11. A single turbo-charger ONLY is permitted. There is no size restriction on the turbo-charger.
12. 20.8" tires the larges allowed with cut tires permitted.
13. All tractors must have wheelie bars that are able to support the weight of the tractor.

SOCIAL AND DIGITAL MEDIA CODE OF CONDUCT

Adopted by the Clarion County Fair Association (CCF) on 3/18/2014

Social media can be defined in many ways. It includes electronic communications and online activities such as text messages, emails, wikis, and social networking like Facebook, Twitter and the like. It also includes posting comments such as on blogs. Because of the blue between personal and professional communications, this Code of Conduct helps explain what is recommended and expected.

1. Remember all internet postings are permanent—able to be duplicated and may go viral.
2. Use your common sense. If you wonder whether or not to communicate or post, don't do it.
3. For your protection and the protection of the CCF, you are prohibited from using internal or external social media channels to discuss confidential items, legal matters, litigation, or the organization's financial performance. Confidential information includes anything labeled as such or information not available to the public. When asked by others to discuss any of these matters, you

should relay that “Our social media policy only allows authorized individuals to discuss these types of matters. I can refer you to an authorized individual if you’d like to ask them.”, and then refer the questions to the APPROPRIATE COMMITTEE OR INDIVIDUAL.

4. Be open and honest about who you are when you communicate. CCF trusts and expects you to exercise personal responsibility whenever you use social media, which includes respecting the trust of those with whom you are engaging. However, these policies are not meant to interfere with your legal rights to bargain collectively or engage in concerted or protected activities.

5. Respect your privacy, your coworkers’ privacy, and the organization’s’ privacy by not providing personal or confidential information without permission. Also, employees/volunteers are prohibited from sharing anything via social media channels that could violated another employee/volunteer’s right to personal privacy.

6. Only those officially designated may use social media to speak on behalf of the CCF organization in an official capacity, though employees/volunteers may use social media to speak for yourself individually. If and when designated persons use social media to communicate on behalf of the organization, they should clearly identify themselves as an employee/volunteer.

7. If you are communicating with youth through any digital or social media, act as you would if you were communicating in person. Specifically, communicate with minors using transparency and in a group, or do not communicate at all. If it is necessary to send an individual message outside of a public area to a minor, copy another adult or parent. Do not initiate a one-on-one relationship (such as friending from a personal profile) with a minor.

8. Do not violate copyright and fair use laws and do not plagiarize another’s work. Obtain permission if you wish to use material created by someone else.

9. Do not use the CCF’s email address or social media channels for personal use.

10. Harassment, threats, intimidation, ethnic slurs, personal insults, pornography, obscenity, racial or religious intolerance, abuse, and any other form of behavior prohibited by law is also prohibited via social media channels. Do not engage in any such behavior and do not make or comment on any such behavior, comments, or remarks.

11. If you are not officially authorized to speak on behalf of the CCF, use a disclaimer saying that what you communicate is your personal opinion and not that of the organization when you are engaging in conversation on the CCF’s social media channels. Two sample social media disclaimers include: (1) “ I work for the CCF, and this is my personal opinion.” Or (2) “I am not an official spokesperson, but my personal opinion is ...”. This requirement is not meant to interfere with your rights to bargain collectively or engage in concerted or protected activities but rather to ensure that others can easily distinguish the official position of the organization or the organization’s leadership from those of our employees/volunteers.

12. Users should use their best judgment when engaging in social media activities and should be on guard against actions and discussions that could harm the interests of our community, faith, or other persons.

13. Before posting photographs of any person, obtain his/her permission.

14. If you see a violation of this Code of Conduct, report it to the office or a director of the CCF. If you have questions about the Code of Conduct, please contact the CCF secretary.

15. All of the CCF's other policies apply to the use of digital and social media. All communication by employees or volunteers should take into account the organization's values, reputation, and workplace policies.

16. Any violation of the CCF's Social and Digital Media Code of Conduct may result in discipline and/or termination of employment or volunteer opportunities. Also, failure to abide by these guidelines and the CCF Code of Conduct could put your participation at risk. The CCF may elect to disqualify your activities at the Fair and render your right to collect premiums there as null and void.
